Keythy's learning to walk

Keythy Milagro is a 5-year-old with cerebral palsy. She was confined to a baby walker that she had seriously outgrown until this July when we were able to take an adjustable walker down with the team to Villanueva. Keythy took to her new six-wheeler immediately and is learning to support herself on her legs and actually walk within the supportive device. She's getting stronger.

Her grandmother Aleyda writes, "Let me tell you, Keythy has made a lot of progress. She can now sit up on the floor by herself, which she couldn't do before. While she doesn't use the walker in the classroom due to bumping into the other children when she moves around, for activities her mother and teacher hold her by the arms so she can participate. The walker has been very useful at home."

Water flows again at a dry community

In May and June of this year we worked in cooperation with Amigos for Christ, a non-profit focused on water restoration to NW Nicaraguan communities, to restore the dry well at Mata de Caña. The school and whole community there depended on a well that had a burned-out pump and was full of sediment. We paid for the new pump and a clean-out, and the Amigos engineers supplied the on-site labor.

This was a particularly urgent need, as the whole community and not just the school benefitted, but it was wonderful to see the kids filling their water bottles during our visit.
